The University of Auckland Summer School Handbook



Welcome to Summer School

The University of Auckland's Summer School programme delivers a selection of undergraduate, postgraduate and General Education courses using a short, intensive teaching format. The programme covers a six-week period from early January to mid-February.

All courses offered are taught and examined to the same standard as normal semester courses.

Why do Summer School?

You can take advantage of the summer break to begin or continue your University degree or diploma studies. You might use it to progress through your programme more quickly or to spread a heavy workload.

If you are completing a conjoint degree, Summer School provides you with greater flexibility for scheduling courses and spreading workloads. It also gives you an opportunity to improve your overall grade point average performance.

In addition to servicing the needs of University of Auckland students, this programme provides opportunities for students from other tertiary institutions to study courses that may be credited back to their home institution degree.

What to expect

Courses are conducted over a shorter time period with a condensed teaching format and a demanding assessment schedule.

Your full commitment will be required for successful completion of the course requirements. You must be able to organise and manage your time effectively. You can expect to spend a minimum of two additional hours of reading and private study for each class contact hour. Language courses are likely to involve different time requirements to other courses.

You will be expected to attend all lectures, tutorial and laboratory classes. You must complete all set work and the final examination (if applicable) in each course studied.

Libraries and Learning Services offers courses to help students learn useful skills for Summer School.

If you are planning to re-enrol in a failed course, you will not be able to carry across course work credit from a previous semester of study. Tests and examinations cannot be rescheduled to accommodate the personal circumstances of individual students.

Selecting a course load

All courses are 15 points (unless otherwise indicated) and the maximum course load you can take over Summer School is 30 points.

Due to the condensed teaching format, 30 points of Summer School courses is at least equal to a workload of 60 points (or more) of courses taken during a normal semester. A maximum load of 15 points is recommended for students new to tertiary study and for those who have studied and completed a 45-point workload during a normal semester with a GPA of less than 3.5. New students are also encouraged to consult faculty student advisers before enrolling.

Summer accommodation

The special summer rates will fit your budget, with options of \$170 a week at Huia Residence for self-catered accommodation or \$269 a week for dinner, bed and breakfast at University Hall. The residences are conveniently close to classes on campus but with easy access to Auckland's other attractions over summer. Enjoy the recreational facilities like an outdoor BBQ area, TV lounge and games room.

You must pre-book your accommodation and a minimum stay of 14 nights is required to enjoy the special rates.

How do you get in?

Entry requirements

New students

If you are a new student, in order to be admitted to the University of Auckland you must have a university entrance qualification and be selected into a programme. Please refer to *The 2015 University of Auckland Undergraduate Prospectus* or www.auckland.ac.nz/admissions for details of entry requirements.

Please note if you are applying for LLB Part I you will need to apply for, and then enrol in, two degrees (LLB and another undergraduate degree), either as conjoint or as double (concurrent) degrees, and choose your LLB Part I non-law courses as a foundation for the other undergraduate degree for which you have been admitted. If you are a new applicant for the LLB and have already completed a degree in New Zealand you may be selected for admission to Part II. Contact the Faculty of Law for further information.

Note: From 2016 the University will introduce an academic English language requirement for entry into all undergraduate programmes. For more information please see www.auckland.ac.nz/aelf

School leavers applying based on NCEA Level 3, CIE or IB (taken in NZ)

Enrolment in Summer School courses is conditional on meeting requirements for admission to the University of Auckland. If you are awaiting final examination results you may be given conditional approval to study Summer School courses.

If you wish to be considered for Summer School you need to have made an application for the BA, BSc, BCom or a Certificate of Proficiency (COP). Within the BSc, majors in Biomedical Science, Food Science and Nutrition, and Sport and Exercise Science are not available for conditional approval.

If, upon receiving your final NCEA, CIE or IB results, you meet the University Entrance Standard and the minimum requirement for entry to your chosen programme, you will be able to confirm your Summer School course enrolments.

If you do not meet the entrance requirements for a particular programme, but obtain a University Entrance qualification, you may be permitted to continue in any Summer School course(s) in which you are enrolled if you elect to enrol in an alternative programme (subject to the approval of the appropriate faculty).

If you do not obtain a University Entrance qualification you will be able to complete the Summer School courses, but will not be permitted to enrol in any further University of Auckland courses until you have attained an entrance qualification and have been selected into a programme.

Applying for admission

Students new to the University of Auckland

If you were not enrolled at the University of Auckland in the year preceding enrolment, you need to complete the online Application for Admission form at www.auckland.ac.nz/applynow

Applications should be submitted to the University by 1 December 2014. No late applications will be accepted.

NOTE: Your application will not be processed until you have submitted all correctly certified required documentation.

If you do not have access to the online Application for Admission, you should contact the University on 0800 61 62 63 or visit the Student Information Centre, The ClockTower, 22 Princes Street, Auckland.

Returning students

If you are intending to apply for a new programme beginning in Summer School, you need to meet the 1 December application deadline.

No late applications will be accepted.

After applying

Applications for Admission to Summer School programmes will be processed in December. You will be notified online and via email regarding offers of a place. You will be required to accept or decline an offer online before Christmas. Remember you still need to enrol online in your choice of available course(s) and pay your tuition fees.

If you do not have internet access you can accept offers and enrol in your course(s) at the Student Information Centre, Room 112, The ClockTower, 22 Princes Street, Auckland, or the faculty student centres.

Enrolment in courses

Enrolment process

All enrolments will be through Student Services Online (www.studentservices.auckland.ac.nz). You can enrol in a maximum load of 30 points over the Summer School period.

If you are not restricted to a minimum full-time load, you will be able to enrol in a further 140 points over Semester One and Two, provided that no more than 80 points are enrolled for in any semester.

The enrolment closing date for full Summer School courses is 22 December 2014. While you may continue to enrol until the start of Summer School, some courses may not be available for enrolment after 22 December.

To change enrolment

Should you wish to drop (delete) courses, you may do so online. The deletion of Summer School courses online will be possible up until the end of Monday 12 January 2015. Courses dropped before this deadline are removed from your academic record and all fees refunded.

No withdrawal from Summer School courses will be permitted after Friday 6 February 2015. Withdrawn courses remain on your academic record and all fees remain owing.

You will be notified if classes are cancelled due to insufficient enrolments.

Academic Standing

If your Academic Standing status is Academic Restriction and Summer School is your first enrolment after restriction, you will be eligible to enrol during the Summer School session. You may enrol in a maximum of 25 points in Summer School courses. It is recommended that you talk to an adviser at your faculty student centre about your options before you enrol.

ID cards

If you are a new student, a student ID card will be sent to your listed mailing address once you have submitted an appropriate ID photo and your enrolment is complete. Returning students will be able to access the

library and computer laboratories using their existing card. If you are a returning student who no longer has a valid ID card, you will need to contact the University as replacement ID cards for returning students are not mailed automatically. If you have any issues with your student ID card you can visit the ID Card Centre in the Student Information Centre or email: idcards@auckland.ac.nz

Tuition fees

The tuition fee per course will be set at the 2015 tuition fee rate. Summer School fees are due by 6 January 2015. Your fees statement can be accessed via Student Services Online. Payment of fees can be made online via Student Services Online, in person at the Cashiers Office, by personal cheque, bank cheque, bank transfer, eftpos (please note that daily bank limits may apply) or another arrangement (eg, student loans, scholarship). Fees must be paid in full by the due date to ensure continued enrolment.

Student loans and allowances

StudyLink administers student loans and allowances. If you want to apply, go online at www.studylink.govt.nz or call 0800 88 99 00.

Student loans

If you wish to pay your Summer School tuition fees with a student loan, you should apply to StudyLink at least two months before study commences, to ensure your fees are paid on time.

To be eligible for a student loan to pay the Summer School tuition fees, you must either be enrolled full-time (at least 25 points) or enrolled in study lasting for at least 32 weeks (ie, Summer School plus Semester One and Semester Two with a minimum of 30 points).

We recommend that you enrol in your Summer School, Semester One and Semester Two courses at the same time. This should ensure you have sufficient points to be eligible, and minimise any delays with the approval of your student loan.

Student allowances

To find out if you are eligible for a student allowance, visit www.studylink.govt.nz or call 0800 88 99 00. You should apply as early as possible to ensure your student allowance is approved before you start your course(s).

Preparation programmes

New Start – University preparation courses

New Start programmes can help you develop the confidence and skills for studying at university. These bridging programmes are part-time and will provide you with a pathway to undergraduate-level study. You must be 20 years or over and be a New Zealand citizen or permanent resident to be eligible to apply. You can successfully complete New Start in one semester then apply for admission in the following semester to an undergraduate degree at the University of Auckland.

New Start General NSGEN 47 will prepare you for an undergraduate degree in Arts, Education, Law, Science or Theology.

New Start General NSGEN 47 and Mathematics Preparation for University NSMAT 14 (both compulsory) will prepare you for an undergraduate degree in Commerce, Property or Science.

Enjoying Mathematics NSMAT 10 (optional) is a mathematics refresher course designed for those who have not completed Year 12 Mathematics at school. We strongly recommend you enrol in this course prior to Mathematics Preparation for University.
